

Activities for Children & Youth on the Trail

Hiker Challenge: Youth Distance Badge

Motivate the children and youth to hike more by challenging them to earn the Youth Distance Badge offered through Hike Nova Scotia's Hiker Challenge program. They keep track of the kilometres they hike over the course of one year:

- Ages 5 to 8: 15 km
- Ages 9 to 12: 30 km
- Ages 13 to 16: 45 km

Scavenger Hunt

Create a checklist of natural things for them to find along the hike and have a scavenger hunt. Be sure they simply find the items and don't collect them (remembering Leave No Trace Principles). Create a list and hand it out at the beginning of the hike. Find some good scavenger hunt ideas here:

Have a Theme

If introducing children and youth to nature is your aim, then consider having a theme for your hike like insects, flowers, trees, birds, rocks, animal tracks and signs, etc. Choose between five and 10 to identify along the way (more than that is just overwhelming). Really focus in on three things and give neat facts and ways of identifying them. If they don't remember all 10 things, they'll at least remember the three you really focused upon.

Magnifying Glasses

Buy some inexpensive hand-held magnifying glasses at a dollar store or toy store and use them on the hike. Encourage the kids to look for small stuff along the trail.

Nature Rubbings

Do Nature rubbings. Use a piece of paper to cover tree bark, a leaf, a rock or other things that have neat textures. Then use the side of a pencil or crayon and rub it over the paper until the pattern of the object emerges on the paper.

You can run these activities at different points along the trail.



Nature Journal

Give the kids a nature journal to use while on the trail. Here's an idea for making a nature journal: www.sierraclub.org/education/nature_journal.asp. Kids of all ages can use the journal on the hike to make nature rubbings, sketch things they see, record the species they see, write their thoughts and create nature poetry.

Geocaching

Find out if there's a geocache along your trail, and if so, introduce the concept of geocaching to the kids and find the cache or caches on your trail together. Learn about geocaching in Nova Scotia here:
